The Guest's Speech

Oct 25, 2003 I am invited to be Guest Speaker at the Wen Shen conference, Taipei Taiwan. I will discuss my philosophy of teaching (constructivist, communicative) in the context of how we used to teach in the mid seventies and early 80's, and how we wished we could teach even then, and how computers changed what was possible for language teachers to do. However, this change came gradually as the role of computers in teaching moved

- a.. from making behaviorist teaching paradigms such as tutorials and drill and practice more efficient,
- b.. through more cognitive approaches such as simulations and better use and analysis of corpora and multimedia,
- c.. to comprehensive access to a world of authentic target language documents via the Internet,
- d.. and most recently to all of the above plus genuine communication and empathy with native and non-native speakers of a target language through formation of communities of practice online and in blended learning situations.

With this background I will speak about the formation of Webheads, from its roots as an experiment in language learning where certain principles maintained; e.g.

- a.. 'it is impossible to teach languages, they must be learned'
- b.. and 'therefore there is no such thing as a language teacher'
- c.. and 'true communication is the only purpose for which anyone would want to learn a language.'
- d.. also, reliance on the principle that good workmen and women might need a little guidance but if we provide the tools, good workmen and women can be counted on to know how to create with them.

Accordingly, Webheads started out as an environment with ingredients such as

- a.. a portal site
- b.. pictures and stories on the portal site
- c.. opportunities to interact in a variety of modalities i.e. synch/asynch, via email, live online, participation in discussion forums, using text/voice/webcam
- d.. keeping records and archives of events
- e.. allowing multiple participants to contribute to and build on the body of knowledge
- f.. (encouraging experimentation even if this led to 'chaos navigation')
- g.. remaining informal.

Writing for Webheads is an ongoing 'experiment in world friendship through online language learning' whose participants have been meeting weekly online for 5 years now.

During that time, Webheads have experimented with numerous synchronous and web-based multimedia communications formats, and presented at several live and online conference venues. More recently, the community has formally expanded to embrace language teaching professionals in a community of practice called Webheads in Action. These communities come together online every Sunday for a regular session held at noon GMT. We occasionally convene members of the community online to demonstrate 'live' our use of free and easily accessible text, video, and voice enhanced synchronous communications technologies, while showing visitors around the Webheads community. Starting as a site where students met with a core group of teachers, Webheads eventually attracted more interest from teaching practitioners while its student side diminished, and has only recently experienced a resurgence in student participation. I hope to be fortunate to have with me at this talk three Webheads participants who have joined us at various stages in this development.

- a.. Ying Lan has been a student participant in Webheads since its inception in 1998, and she has left us a long web record of her accomplishments and interactions with us.
- b.. Aiden Yeh is a teacher and a more recent arrival at Webheads but she too has developed an impressive web record of collaboration with other teachers as well as student participants in Webheads.
- c.. Venny Su, another long-time member of our group, makes productive use of the reliable availability of interactants online to further his own projects and feed back to Webheads who share his interests. I am hoping these longtime online friends can be present and can say a few words to the audience.

Finally, if it is possible to webcast our event, I hope to have some time to take questions and comments from both the physically present and online audiences.
